Almost every member of the club has a special moment, outing or trips that they have shared with Kim. There was nothing that Kim loved better than getting out in his 4WD and enjoying the great outdoors with great company from the Subaru Club.



From my earliest memories of traveling with Kim and the club he simply adored his Toyota 100 Series Landcruiser with signature Rooftop Tent and Cape York souvenir rear number plate. Kim was an innovator when it came to camping and always had the latest gadgets and camping gear. He enjoyed nothing better than sharing a wine around a good campfire at night with his club friends and talking about the world. Kim as a 4WDer was always up for a challenge and travelled some of the toughest tracks around the country with the club on day trips and many extended trips. He was always one of the first to lend a hand when anyone was in trouble on or off the track.

In 2010 not long after a Subaru Club trip to Cape York, Kim started not feeling well and soon was diagnosed with some tumours' in and around his stomach. He immediately underwent multiple surgeries at Westmead Hospital and subsequently spent almost 12 months in hospital and at many times this was touch and go. A testament to the strong man Kim was he pulled through and made an almost full recovery back to normal life. Kim now had a new outlook on life and let me tell you he made the most of it from here on in. Kim returned to his work in corrective services and re-joined Subaru Club members on many more trips to come and even made many more new club member friends. He sold his house and embarked on a new lifestyle with the building of a brand-new home at Jordan Springs, he also reluctantly parted with his beloved 100 Series Cruiser and updated to a new more modern 4WD Ute with Tray Back Camper that many members today are familiar with. Kim also started other adventures of the two-wheel kind with many motorcycling trips away, also cycling with friends became a hobby to keep in good health. For the past 12+ years, Kim had certainly been enjoying his life to the fullest and seeing many other parts of our country.

An interesting fact about Kim, and I believe that he could almost have been the original inventor of this photographic technique known as "The Selfie". Long before people had smart phones or even a phone with a camera, Kim on Subaru Club day trips and extended trips would hold his point & shoot camera in the air, arm extended out and would proceed to take a photo of himself in front of his 4WD, famous landmarks/scenery and just enjoying himself. We would all look at him and think what is he doing? But to his credit he had many photo albums of himself at places he had visited as a souvenir keep sakes. Later with the advent of social media he was a master of "The Selfie" and his technique was adopted by many others worldwide and even the younger generations of today. I will always remember Kim as the first person I knew taking this style of photo.

It is with great sadness that we no longer have Kim with us in our Subaru Club 4WDing family, but I know each and every one of you will cherish the times and memories you shared with Kim.

Draft amendment to the Kosciuszko National Park Wild Horse Heritage Management Plan

The Minister for the Environment, the Hon Penny Sharpe, has announced the start of public consultation on a draft amendment to the *Kosciuszko National Park Wild Horse Heritage Management Plan 2021*. The draft amendment proposes to authorise aerial shooting as an available method to control wild horses, in addition to existing methods such as ground shooting, trapping and rehoming. The draft amendment is available on the <u>Environment and</u> <u>Heritage website</u>.

Submissions close on **11 September 2023.** Late submissions will not be accepted. Multiple submissions from the same author will be counted as a single submission. All submissions will be provided to the Minister for the Environment for her consideration in deciding whether to adopt the amendment.

Public exhibition of Blue Mountains National Park and Kanangra-Boyd National Park Draft Plan of Management

The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is currently exhibiting a draft plan of management for Blue Mountains National Park and Kanangra-Boyd National Park until **26 September 2023**. When adopted, the new plan will replace the current plans for these parks which were adopted in 2001. In Darug and Gundungurra Country, the parks are a significant component of one of the largest and most intact stretches of protected bushland in New South Wales. They are part of the Greater Blue Mountains Area World and National Heritage property, contain significant areas of wilderness, occupy a large part of the Sydney Drinking Water Catchment, and are one of the key attractions in a major tourism region.

Key management directions proposed in the new draft plan include:

improving recognition of the parks significant values, including World and National Heritage values, and providing for adaptive management to protect the values recognising and supporting the continuation of partnerships with Aboriginal communities providing outstanding nature based experiences for visitors through improvements to visitor facilities.

The draft plan is accompanied by the Blue Mountains National Park and Kanangra-Boyd National Park Draft Planning Considerations report. It is recommended that readers of the plan refer to the planning considerations report for detailed explanations of the park's values and management considerations. Demerit points relief for safe drivers

All unrestricted NSW licence holders – including professional drivers – are eligible for a demerit point trial that aims to reward responsible driving behaviour. During the trial, if an eligible driver maintains an offence free record during the trial period, one demerit point will be removed from their driving record. The trial will run from 17 January 2023 until 16 January 2024. There is no need to register for the trial, all unrestricted licence holders are automatically included. At the completion of the trial, Transport for NSW will undertake a process to identify those eligible for the deduction of a demerit point. The demerit point deduction is expected to take effect mid-April 2024. Learner and provisional licence holders are not included in the trial as they are subject to strict conditions of the Graduated Licensing Scheme. Safe driving behaviour cannot be underestimated as we work together to create a safer driving environment for all road users and ultimately push road trauma to zero.

Watch Out – Shorebirds About!

Spring is here and beach-nesting birds have started setting up home on sandy beaches along the NSW coastline, including area's popular for 4WDing, including Worimi Conservation Lands (Stockton Beach), Hawks Nest, Old Bar & Harrington. Shorebirds such as endangered Pied Oystercatchers and Little Terns lay their eggs in shallow scraped-out nests in the sand, their eggs, and chicks camouflage so well against the sand they are almost invisible and easy to step on or crush.

Known nest sites may be indicated by fencing or signs. Keep a look out for unmarked nests.

• Endangered Little Terns migrate thousands of kilometres from eastern Asia to lay their eggs on Australian beaches every summer, usually arriving on NSW beaches between September to November.

- · At less than 25cm long, Little Terns are the smallest terns in NSW.
- They have 'black caps' over white feathers with pale-grey wings
- The breeding population of little terns in NSW has been declining by 2.6% per year from 2001 to 2020.
- Pied Oystercatchers are distinctive, black-and-white shorebirds with pink legs and red beaks. Almost always seen
- in pairs, they live in Australia year-round, and usually start nesting in August or September.
- \cdot 'Oystercatcher' is bit of a misnomer, as this species eats many other invertebrates as well as oysters and other

bivalve molluscs.

• Eggs of beach-nesting birds are speckled and blotched to provide camouflage but are still at risk of predators both on the ground and from the air. Predators of shorebird eggs include foxes, dogs, dingoes, ravens, silver gulls, and goannas.

• Beach-nesting birds lay their eggs in shallow scrapes in the sand, often on estuary entrance bars up and down the coast.

Can you find a Purple Copper Butterfly?

If you live in or visit the Central Tablelands you may see a rare iridescent treat this spring. The purple copper butterfly spreads its wings from late August to late October, and citizen scientists are needed to record sightings. "The endangered purple copper butterfly is only found with native blackthorn bush, around the Bathurst, Lithgow and Oberon areas, and above 850m elevations. They fly on fine, sunny days" said Jess Peterie, Threatened Species Officer. "Purple coppers have beautiful iridescent metallic coloration on their backs, so in the sunlight there are flecks of purple and blue – photos really don't do it justice. 

UP UP AND AWAY - A HIGH FLYING DAY TRIP

Subarus have strong links to the aviation industry.

Subarus are built by the Subaru Corporation, which up until 2017 was called Fuji Heavy Industries. FHI traces its roots to the Nakajima Aircraft Company, a leading supplier of airplanes to the Japanese government during World War II.

Currently, the aerospace division of the Subaru Corporation makes utility and attack helicopters for the Japanese Self Defense Force, trainers, unmanned aerial vehicles, and the centre wings of Boeing 777 and Boeing 787 jets. In the past, FHI made parts for the Hawker Beechcraft and Eclipse Aviation business jets.

In celebration of these links with aviation, David planned a magnificent trip for us, beginning at the new Western Sydney Airport, travelling down to the HARS Aviation Museum at Shellharbour Airport, and finishing at Stanwell Tops, where, in 1894, pioneer aviator Lawrence Hargrave rose 16 feet off the ground under a collection of box-kites.

We began our day at the Western Sydney International Airport Experience Centre at 9:45, under threatening skies. Living closest to Luddenham, I was of course the last to arrive, earning me the privilege of writing this report.



The Experience Centre was a great way to learn all about our new airport, which is set to open in 2026. The presentations were very informative, and we were able to ask the guide lots of questions. The terminal buildings will handle domestic and international flights together, and access to the site will be aided by new road and rail links. A second runway is expected to open in 2050.



We then headed down to Albion Park to explore the HARS (Historical Aircraft Restoration Society) Aviation Museum, which is adjacent to Shellharbour Airport. What an amazing place!

After a delicious lunch at Café Connie (I had an egg and lettuce sandwich, a lamington and a vanilla milkshake), we headed off on our tour which was even more interesting than many of us had expected. We had a great walk through a jumbo jet, venturing into Business Class, which was a first for most of us.

John Hocking (ex QANTAS Jet Engine Base Manager) had sent us a fascinating article from March 2015 titled "No room for error, as Qantas prepares to land 747-400 at regional airport" which told the amazing story of how the *City of Canberra* had been brought there from Sydney Airport on a flight which was unprecedented in many ways due to the small runway at Shellharbour Airport.



We also saw a huge range of other aircraft including a General Dynamics F-III, a Mirage fighter, a number of Douglas DC3s, a Super Constellation, a Catalina Flying Boat, and a Sabre CA-27 fighter. My favourite was a replica of Sir Charles Kingsford Smith's *Southern Cross* Fokker FVIIB, the original holding the record for the first-ever trans-Pacific flight to Australia in 1928.



The museum is run by volunteers, many of whom have a background in aviation. Funds raised go to the maintenance and restoration of the aircraft. We all commented on how the admission cost was great value for money. We were allowed to enter many of the aircraft, and even take a seat in the cockpit of some. I'll certainly be visiting again, next time I'm showing people around the area.



After our tour of the museum, we travelled through the beach suburbs of Wollongong, heading to the lookout at Stanwell Tops. Not only are the views there excellent, the area is also internationally known as a major hang-gliding point. It was on the beach below the lookout at Bald Hill that Lawrence Hargrave made his historic flight way back in 1894. eNews



Bald Hill also overlooks the iconic Sea Cliff Bridge which extends along the Grand Pacific Drive, a 140 kilometre coastal drive beginning 45 minutes south of Sydney International Airport in the Royal National Park. I was reminded of our Australia Day get-together in 2022, when Brett Atkins took me to the secret lookout above the Sea Cliff Bridge to take some photos.



Big thanks go to David Wellham for organising such a fantastic day out. I won't mention that I got a bit lost on the way home, because I wouldn't want our Serjeant-at-Arms to hear about that.


