# **Association News & Updates: November 2023**



Hello from Bill Twyman, Daniel Sorrasson and David Wellham – your friendly Delegates to Four Wheel Drive NSW & ACT (Association). Association documents are located on our website. #### November Quarterly meeting – Liverpool on 18 November 2023 Club 4x4 Insurance

There was a presentation by Club 4x4 Insurance detailing their product and discounts available to members, more details in future Association newsletters.

President Craig Thomas spoke about the highs and lows of past 12 months.

There are many more highs during the past year that outweigh the two lows.

There are still isolated incidents regarding Engineered vehicles by some Police Officers – issues need to be reported by using the complaint form that is sent to Police Commissioner.

NPWS – ongoing issues with booking system for camping and isolated issues with some Rangers. NPWS are learning they are not serving community and changes to legislation is being considered to improve how they deal with User Groups.

There is greatly improved communication with clubs.

Craig was invited and sits on committee working on National Parks handover to First Nations groups.

AAAA – recognition is high with this National Business association and we are also a member of ACMC that allows members to access Classic Vehicle Scheme and a seat on Vehicle Standards working group. These groups are working on sound checks on vehicles as they are not possible with current requirements and the Suspension standard is due to be reviewed.

A 'User Group Association' is in the early stages of commencing.

VP Lounge – a member from each club is invited to join the VP Lounge ZOOM meetings to discuss topics to assist clubs – membership and survey of enquiries at Show have been recent topics.

Treasurer – 65 clubs, \$181,680 in funds including balance of trailer grant.

Gardens of Stone – zip line is not going ahead at this time, large camping area and multi day walk is going ahead, there is thru road being put in and road to tunnel is now 2WD standard, currently 127 kms of tracks and some will close, there might be a permit system for some tracks.

National Council – There was a long discussion on the issues with National Council over the past year. There are issues with how meetings are conducted, minutes written and how decisions are made including non-members allowed to control meetings. Insurance does not cover visitors (our insurance does cover visitors) and is more expensive and being subsidised by our fees. After much discussion a motion was moved and passed to resign from National Council immediately. NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service, Notifications of public exhibition. The Dorrigo National Park, Bindarri National Park and Bindarri State Conservation Area Draft Plan of Management is being publicly exhibited until 15 January 2024.

These parks are in the Mid-North Coast region of New South Wales. Key management directions proposed in the draft plan of management include to: support and celebrate Aboriginal cultural values and strengthen partnerships with Gumbaynggirr People; protect, enhance and promote World Heritage and National Heritage values; provide a world class Gondwana Rainforest experience through improvements to visitor facilities, development of the Dorrigo Escarpment great walk and the redevelopment of the Dorrigo Arc Rainforest Centre. Draft Master Plans for the proposed Dorrigo Escarpment Great Walk and the Dorrigo Arc Rainforest Centre are also on public exhibition until 15 January 2024. These subsidiary draft plans describe the proposed location and design of the new multi-day walking experience, and replacement visitor centre and elevated walkway for Dorrigo National Park. The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is currently exhibiting draft amendments to the Gardens of Stone National Park and Wollemi National Park Plans of Management. The parks are in the Blue Mountains Region of New South Wales. Key issues addressed in the draft amendments include: construction of sections of walking track and a campground to create a multi-day Wollemi great walk through Wollemi and Gardens of Stone national parks, construction of short walks and lookouts in the former Newnes State Forest which was added to Wollemi National Park in May 2022, changes to cycling access to sections of existing tracks to enhance visitor experiences in the area.

The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is currently exhibiting a draft Plan of Management for Killalea Regional Park until 29 January 2024. Killalea Regional Park is on Dharawal Country, between Shellharbour and Kiama in the Illawarra Region of NSW. The draft plan describes how NPWS proposes to manage the park and includes proposals to: acknowledge significant cultural connections and strengthen partnerships with Aboriginal people, protect and manage important biodiversity and coastal ecosystems including a critically endangered vegetation community and a freshwater lagoon, support recreation activities and opportunities for learning including upgrades to visitor facilities.

The draft plan is accompanied by a draft precinct plan that includes more details about the design and construction of the proposed upgrades to the park's main visitor precinct. It is recommended that readers of the plan refer to the draft precinct plan for more details on these proposals.

Kosciuszko National Park Wild Horse Management

#### Stakeholder Update, October 2023

Kosciuszko National Park Wild Horse Heritage Management Plan amended

The NSW Government has adopted an amendment to the Kosciuszko National Park Wild Horse Heritage Management Plan that authorises aerial shooting as an approved method to reduce the number of wild horses in the park. The amendment allows the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service to use aerial shooting in addition to existing control methods such as trapping and rehoming and ground shooting, to reach the legally required wild horse population target of 3,000 by mid-2027.

Following consideration of all submissions, Minister for the Environment Penny Sharpe determined the amendment is necessary to help save endangered and vulnerable species and their habitat, protect soil and waterways and conserve cultural heritage. The proposal to amend the plan was put on exhibition for community input and attracted more than 11,000 submissions. Advice from the Wild Horse Community Advisory Panel and National Parks and Wildlife Advisory Council was also considered. Of the submissions which commented on aerial shooting, 82 per cent expressed support for the control method being included in the plan. # DRIVER AWARENESS NEWS

On the weekend of November 4 and 5, David W. led a Driver Awareness trip which began in Capertee. Due to the Turon National Park being unexpectedly closed, we headed for Sofala and Hill End, and then on to the Bridle Track. Along the way, MJ Hamilton found us some great training locations, with water crossings and hill climbs of varying difficulty.

Some of us overnighted at Mount York, and on Sunday we travelled along Kings Tableland Road, completing the theory section of the weekend in the shelter of Battleship Rock.

On Saturday November 11, Bill and I attended a Driver Awareness Facilitator (DAF) Workshop at Asquith Bowling Club. The agenda included how to deliver the Association's 4WD presentation, do's and don'ts for soft shackles, and an in-depth look at the hierarchy of recovery.



# **UHF CB Operating Frequencies (Australia)**

# Refer to the Chart on Page 18.

Channels 1 to 8 <mark>(not including 5)</mark> and 41 to 48 are designated as repeater output channels, with channels 31 to 38 <mark>(not including 35)</mark> and 71 to 78 the corresponding designated repeater input channels. For example: A repeater that transmits on channel 1 will always receive on channel 31.

DO NOT USE THESE CHANNELS. (Not unless you want your conversation heard all over NSW and beyond)

Channel 5 and 35 are the designated emergency channels in Australia, and are not to be used except in an emergency. Making an emergency call involves switching the radio to Channel 5 with duplex on, and trying again with duplex off if there's no response.

Channel 22 and 23 are only to be used for telemetry and telecommand. Packet data and voice transmission are not allowed. Channels 22 and 23 remain the only designated wideband channels still present under the 80 channel UHF CB narrowbanding – this is due to the fact that telemetry and telecommand data often requires a wider spectral channel to achieve the modulation required to carry data. It should be noted however that any carrier on these channels should not exceed 16kHz as was the case with the previous wideband UHF CB class licence – this is to ensure that appropriate guard bands are present to prevent bleed-over into channels 21 and 25.

Channel 61, 62 and 63 are reserved for future allocation and transmission on these channels is not allowed.

Channel 40 commonly used by truck or oversized vehicle drivers: This channel is Australia's main road safety resource.



Well done Bill for finding me.


