New LPG cylinder valve - LCC27 or Type 27 connection


In recent years, concerns have been raised regarding incidents resulting from leaked gas due to a known weakness in the Type 21 'POL' cylinder valve. Standards Australia published AS/NZS 5601.1:2013 Amendment 4 and AS/NZS 5601.2:2020 which included a change from the Type 21 'POL' connection on an LPG cylinder to a new safer leisure cylinder connection (LCC27) known as a Type 27 connection.

Amendments have also been made to other Australian Standards:


• AS 4627:2017; AS 2473.2:2015; AS 2473.1:2006; AS/NZS 5263.1.7

LPG cylinders between 3kg and 9kg that are commonly used with portable barbecues and patio heaters are affected by this change. Larger LPG cylinders including those connected to domestic homes are not affected. The LPG cylinder outlet connections and LPG appliance input connection on all new items are now Type 27. The new connection is compatible with the connections used on existing appliances. While the old Type 21 appliance connections is cross-compatible and can be used with both the old and the new cylinders, the new appliance connections are only compatible with new cylinder valves. Eventually all leisure cylinders and associated gas appliances will be operating with the new connection as they have a 10-year test cycle. The new LPG cylinder connection has additional safety advantages over the old Type 21 connection that are expected to significantly reduce the number of cylinder connection fires and injuries. The new cylinder valve incorporates a check valve that will only enable gas to flow when a gas tight connection is made, reducing the risk of high-pressure gas escaping if the cylinder valve is opened during transportation or disconnected during use. The new connection features a large diameter righthanded thread that is able to be operated without the use of tools. Perishable rubber seals are located with the body of the gas valve, they can be assessed for damage during the refilling process, and are replaced with the cylinder valve every 10 years as part of the cylinder test process. The connection also incorporates a thermal shutoff that allows the internal check valve to close and remove gas supply if the connection is exposed to a fire.

Beach Driving this Summer? WATCH OUT, SHOREBIRDS ABOUT!

Threatened shorebirds are nesting a little early this year on Port Stephens' sandy shores. NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) Threatened Species Officer Katherine Howard said pied oystercatcher eggs have already been found at Port Stephens, which is a key breeding area. "Endangered pied oystercatchers and little terns lay eggs in shallow scraped-out nests on beaches and sandy shores," Ms Howard said. Shorebird eggs and chicks camouflage so well against the sand they are almost invisible and very easy to inadvertently step on or drive over.



There are only around 450 nesting pairs of little terns in New South Wales, with the breeding population declining 2.6 per cent each year from 2001 to 2020. Surprisingly there are even fewer Pied Oystercatchers. They are a distinctive shorebird and regularly seen, but there are fewer than 200 breeding pairs in New South Wales. Shorebirds nest on sandy beaches right along the NSW coastline, including Harrington sandspit, Farquhar Inlet, Corrie and the Worimi Conservation Lands (Stockton Beach). Drivers should follow the local beach driving rules for each location. Visitors to the Worimi Conservation Lands are asked to keep away from nesting areas marked by signs or fences, always follow the <u>Worimi beach</u> driving rules and reminded that dogs are only allowed on a 3-kilometre section of the beach south of Birubi Headland. Nest sites may be indicated by fences or signs; however, chicks are mobile, and they don't necessarily stay within marked nesting areas.

Four steps to help keep shorebirds safe. Look out for bird nesting signs or fenced-off nesting areas on the beach, stay well clear of these areas and give the parent birds plenty of space. Walk dogs only on designated dog-friendly beaches and always keep them on a leash over summer. Drive only on designated vehicle beaches, stay out of nesting areas and follow all local beach-driving rules. Chicks are mobile within three days of hatching and don't necessarily stay within fenced nesting areas. Stick to the wet **sand** to avoid accidentally stepping on a chick.

Illegal mining on the Peel River



The NSW Resources Regulator has been made aware of illegal fossicking on the Peel River, Nundle NSW. Fossicking activity is unlawful if prohibited powered mining equipment is used and the person undertaking fossicking has not obtained the required consent to fossick on private land and waters.

Unlawful equipment includes:

High banker' sluices (smaller animated writing - when used with powered water pumps)

Mobile plant (smaller animated writing backhoes, dozers, excavators); Mechanised dredges

Power operated trommels; Powered gold wheels; Alluvial mining plant; Concentrators

Jack hammers; Water pumps

Consents are necessary for fossicking on private land, Crown Land, State forests, National Parks, land or waters subject to native title, or land held under a mining or petroleum authorisation.

Fossicking can be a popular recreational activity to search for and collect minerals, gemstones and mineral bearing material. However, there are laws in place to protect NSW's natural environment and the rights of landowners. Due the increased activity on the Peel River, the NSW Resources Regulator is planning to carry out compliance to stop these illegal mining activities. Illegal mining penalties include on the spot fines of up to \$2,500.

Namatjira water tanks - a work of art





The Murray River community of Namatjira recently celebrated enhanced water security with festivities, including a smoking ceremony, traditional dancing, speeches and a barbecue. Two 255 kilolitre raw water tanks were built last year to improve water reliability for the community. The tanks increased available water storage and replaced an old water tower which had reached the end of its design life. The new tanks also highlight the community's spiritual connection to water. They are the canvas for a stunning artwork by Maura/Barkindji artist John Mitchell, depicting his people fishing and living along the riverbank. Another mural has been added on the pump station, celebrating local sporting heroes. The \$3 million upgrade was led and funded by the department as part of the Aboriginal Communities Water and Sewerage Program. It was collaboratively supported by Dareton Local Aboriginal Land Council, Wentworth Shire Council, NSW Public Works and contractors.

First off thanks everyone for participating in what I think was the largest attendance at one of our Oktoberfest events and very happy to see that everyone made it to the location even if the "red letterbox" I gave as a signpost had been painted blue since our last trip to Olinda! A special thanks to Fiona, Brett, Chantelle and Craig for their efforts in making this event happen.

I thought I should do a reccie on the way as I had recommended an option to get to the hall so I travelled via the Glen Davis then Glen Alice roads as it's such a scenic drive.



A bit potholed in places but not surprising as the area has still not fully recovered from floods and fires. The locals told me the Glen Alice Road was impassable after the Cudgegong River flooded in March 2022 for the second time in less than a year and Dunns Swamp also burst its banks. The water level at the hall rose to the top of the concrete step at the front door.



As a result of these events government grants have helped pay for some significant improvements to the 120 year-old hall since our last visit in 2019 and include upgrades to the kitchen, a dishwasher even, plus how about that new awning- wow – a comment was made that in 300 years the hall will have fallen down but the awning will still be standing! The additional space provided by the concrete extension under the awning was also very useful. A newly added combustion heater in the hall provides necessary warmth while a Telstra antenna on the hall roof meant excellent reception.







Craig was the first to arrive bright and early on Friday morning and we had quite a few members arriving and setting up by 9-9:30am. Others trickled in as the day progressed and all were engaged mainly in setting up camp, catching up with other members and generally relaxing. 

Heritage Listed1: No Bit Of History Nindigilly Pub is

Queensland's oldest hotel located in its original condition and position on the banks of the Moonie River. The license was issued in 1864 after operating as shearer's accommodation for the Nindigully Station. The Gully, as it's affectionately known, brewed its own beer and spirits before XXXX and Bundaberg Rum even existed. Today the boom town of approximately 50 people and 15 houses of the early 1900s have been reduced to two houses, the pub, the old General Store and the Town Hall with a population of six! The Gully is a must see for Australian history buffs as you can feel it all around you from the original buildings to the traditional farming lands.
