Car plate dimensions 317mm x 134mm

Australian Confederation of Motor Clubs (ACMC) has been working on these new plates for several years. Thanks to industry feedback, collaboration, consultation and testing, a new number plate for classic vehicles is now available. The plate size and design better fits most classic vehicles and enhances authenticity by differentiating classic vehicles from others on the road. The new number plate replaces the Conditional number plate traditionally issued to vehicles in the scheme. It will be automatically issued to new Classic Vehicle Scheme registrations and available to be purchased for a one-off fee of \$55 for existing vehicles in the scheme at the time of registration renewal. The new plates are a demonstration of the collaborative relationship between industry and Transport for NSW. They represent a customer centric solution to our needs and help to differentiate classic vehicles from other conditionally registered vehicles. The Australian Confederation of Motors Clubs (ACMC) are proud to have been instrumental in this result.

Did you know: 4WD NSW and ACT Inc is a founding member of the ACMC and its President Craig Thomas is also the President of the ACMC, representing over 800 000 members and approx 600 motoring clubs in NSW and the ACT.





Seatbelts are recommended for all vehicles where installation is possible. If a seatbelt is available, it must be used. Wearing a seatbelt doubles the chance of surviving a crash and reduces the risk of injury. Each year, around 29 people are killed and 76 are seriously injured on NSW roads because they were not wearing an available seatbelt. Passengers who are in a vehicle that does not have seatbelts fitted should sit in the back seat, where possible. Seatbelt detection cameras detect vehicles where a seatbelt is not worn properly by both drivers and passengers. As with police detection, the driver can be fined and have demerits applied if they and/or their passengers are not wearing their seatbelt properly. The age of the vehicle and the requirement of the vehicle to have seatbelts fitted will be considered by trained officers in determining whether to issue a fine. It is important to make sure your vehicle is compliant and has the appropriate registration.

A vehicle that does not have seatbelts installed must be compliant with the relevant legislation and/or Australian Design Rules at the time of manufacture. Registering a classic or historic vehicle does not mean that you are automatically exempt from seatbelt compliance. Existing child car seat and seatbelt road rules continue to apply. Seatbelt detection operates in a similar way to mobile phone detection. Cameras will capture images of passing vehicles in all traffic and weather conditions. Artificial intelligence software then automatically reviews images and detects potential offences. The images showing likely offences go through several stages of human review before a fine is issued. NSW Police will also continue to enforce seatbelt and restraint compliance. If you receive a fine but believe you haven't committed an offence, you can request a review by Revenue NSW. More information about requesting a review is available on the Revenue NSW website. 


DRIVER AWARENESS NEWS

DON'T FEED THE ANIMALS

There are few things that match the thrill of encountering a wild animal in its natural habitat. It's a rare and unique glimpse into wildlife playing out right in front of you! When you encounter an inquisitive native buddy, your first thought might be to offer them a bit of your organic muesli bar. It seems like a great idea at the time, right?

Unfortunately all of those "Don't feed the animals" signs are there for a reason, and while it might feel good at the time, feeding wildlife can have real and harmful knock-on effects.

But why, what's the big deal ??

Human food is not for native animals

Let's be honest, that chocolate-coated muesli bar in your pack may be OK for you, but it's not good for a wild animal that's not used to processed human food. Losing the balance of their natural diet can make wildlife very sick, as can many of the ingredients in your lunchbox. Animals can quickly become addicted to the convenience of human food and focus on seeking it out instead of eating a balanced diet.

They lose their ability to forage and exercise less

Many native animals are adapted to spending hours foraging for healthy food in native bushland. Throw human food into the mix and they can become lazy, hanging around people all day, forgetting to exercise when they would normally be foraging around.

Animals can become so used to receiving food that they become reliant on handouts instead of foraging for their natural food. This can result in some animals starving despite being surrounded by edible bushland during low season when humans aren't around.

They'll ruin your stuff to get it

Food's my biggest motivator and I'm a well-adjusted, civilised human. Now imagine what a possum will do for a tasty piece of white bread! Feeding the animals gives them a taste of the contents of your camp pantry, making it incredibly difficult to keep your food safe from them.

Determined animals with a taste for human food (and no fear of humans because they've been hand-fed) will often damage tents and cooking equipment to find a morsel.

Hand-fed animals can become aggressive

You're never the only person to offer food to the kangaroo hopping around camp. Wild animals can come to rely on humans for food and can become aggressive when they're not fed; very dangerous and unpleasant. Make sure you're not ruining it for future visitors just so that you can get a little closer to the wildlife.

Looks can be deceiving. Kangaroos can look extremely nice and cuddly, but if you get too close or try to feed them they can become dangerously aggressive very quickly and viciously attack, particularly the large males during mating season or females protecting their joeys.

It disrupts the natural order

Wild animals have a single-minded focus on the next chow-down, so if a popular walk or campsite becomes a reliable food source, animals tend not to leave. This can lead to increased population densities of some species forcing other vulnerable species out and increasing the spread of disease. It can also impact natural breeding cycles and cause birds to stop their natural migration patterns.

Their aim isn't perfect: you could lose a finger!

Hand-feeding goannas might seem like a good way to get close to these magnificent lizards but do you really want your fingers getting that close to the sharp teeth of this poorly sighted, powerful animal? With those razor-sharp claws, you also really don't want these climbing experts to get a fright and mistake you for a tree! Possums may look all cute and innocent too, especially the ones with joeys on their backs, but many people have been bitten by a possum who has mistaken a finger for a piece of fruit.

If you want to see wildlife, it's best to visit them in their habitat, rather than encouraging them into ours. So avoid throwing uneaten food into the bushes and giving the animals rotting leftovers from the barbie.


It might sound like a guilt trip but the fact is, feeding native animals is the worst thing you can do for them, despite how cute they are or how much they appear to be enjoying it. National parks are about experiencing the pristine environment in its natural state. So get out there and spot some native animals. And keep your snacks to yourself.

WHERE WAS I

Last months co-ordinates were 29°21′19.0″S 153°21′04.8″E has my location at Woody Head Camp Ground in the Bundjalung National Park a little North of Iluka.

The park is a wilderness area of coastal heath plains, lagoons and a coastal river system with a magnificent stretch of sandy beach. Bird life is prolific with some 205 species having been identified. Other attractions include the Iluka Nature Reserve preserving a small area of littoral rainforest.

The regions temperate climate makes Bundjalung a popular weekend destination catering for both day visitors and those staying longer. Beach driving is permitted along a 12km section of the beach within the park.

<u>Camping:</u> There are commercial camping areas in Evans Head and Iluka which are suitable for campers, caravans etc. Bush camping is not allowed in the Bundjalong National Park, however there is a selection of camping areas within the park.

Woody Head Camping area. 150 sites. Toilets and showers, disabled facilities, table, water and fireplaces. Bookings for camping can be made up to 6 months in advance.

Black Rock rest area, has toilets, fireplaces but no water.

Yabbra rest area, has toilets, fireplaces and tables but no water.

Booroora rest area. has toilets, fireplaces and tables but no water.

What to see and do: Activities include fishing, walking trails, canoeing, bird watching, soaking up the sun on the beach and 4WD driving along the beach.
