Murramarang National Park 5 Day Camp, Pretty Beach

Pretty Beach is located in the Murramarang National Park just south of Ulladulla. An idyllic place at any time of the year, the natural bush setting of the campsites and unspoilt beach make it a perfect spot to relax and unwind. The campsites vary in size and there is also powered sites and cabins available. Phone reception is

limited to the top of the hill for Optus and Vodafone customers, but Telstra works in the camping area. Hot showers (\$1 for 4 minutes) and flushing toilets provide all the comforts of home and the road is now tar all the way into the campground. Open fires are also permitted (when there are no fire bans in place)








Murramarang National Park offers an abundance of drives, lookouts, beaches and walks. All are easily accessible and clearly marked on maps and trail head markers. It is also the start of the newly opened Murramarang South Coast Hike; a 3 day, 2 night hike along some stunning coastal scenery, rainforest and bush tracks. 3 of us embarked on the first 10km's of the trek and from what we saw in overcast weather would be nothing short of spectacular on a clear, sunny day. The walk was pretty easy

going for the most part, but departure time is tide dependant as the first day involves a lot walking a long coastal rock shelves. The track is clearly marked and Nathan, Chris and I had a great morning taking in the coastal scenery at a leisurely pace. Kelly & Cherie collected us from Depot Beach. Would love to go back and complete the entire 34kms – one day.......





The wildlife at camp was over friendly, although not aggressive. A kangaroo stole half an English muffin from Paul's toaster when it popped up, a kookaburra swooped down and stole a sausage straight out of Chris's frying pan and a possum made short work of Kevin's garbage bag that was up in his kitchen sink. The kangaroos are everywhere throughout the camp and all the way down to the beach itself.







We spent the days relaxing in sunny weather, did a couple of shorts walks that departed close to camp and had a campfire and fivsies each evening. Some went for short drives to explore more of the National Park & local shops whilst others braved the cold and went for a swim.







A visit to Mogo on Thursday saw everyone devour the biggest, freshest scones I have ever seen and came with heaps of jam and fresh cream. We wandered the quaint town that has unique and quirky shops and it is good to see that it is slowly rebuilding and drawing visitors again after the devasting fires a few years back. Everyone made their own way back to camp after various stops along the way. I had a quick look at Batemans Bay before exploring Maloneys Beach and then driving back to Pretty Beach.

A beautiful spot to relax and unwind for a couple of days. The end of this trip was also the starting point for the extended trip *Destination NSW* which headed off down the coast on Friday morning.

We left Mystery Bay today to head to Bega via Tilba. The Bega Cheese co-op was founded in 1899. Many of the current owners are made up from over 100 farmers which make it truly Australian owned. Bega's original cheese factory was opened in 1900 & today employs over 500 staff from the Bega region.

Today Bega cheese produces 50,000 tonnes of cheese from vintage blocks to sliced & cubed cheese and is currently one of the largest companies in the dairy sector in Australia today.




Camp sites were great, toilets close by, beach a walk away, sites were roomy & fires were great.

WHERE WAS I

Last months co-ordinates were 29°26′02.7″S 142°00′35.9″E has my location at Tibooburra NSW.

Tibooburra is tucked away in the northwestern corner of the state, this is one of the furthest reaches of NSW. But it's worth the distance you'll cover to get here – with the spectacular Sturt National Park on its doorstep, it's a great base to explore the region's magnificent gorges and rippling red sandhills, as well as the unique history of this former gold mining settlement.

Gold was found around Tibooburra in 1880, and you can read all about it at the Courthouse Museum. Step back in time and gain insights into the way of life of settlers who came to this remote town to make their fortune. Browse artefacts from sheep stations once housed where Sturt National Park now lies, as well as an original medical kit from the Royal Flying Doctor Service.


Tibooburra's Pioneer Park is the site of a remarkable sculpture, Myth and Mirage 1999. The upside-down whaleboat is an exact replica of the boat Captain Charles Sturt dragged from Adelaide, in order to cross the inland sea he was convinced he would discover in the centre of Australia
