Association News & Updates: October 2024

NSW National Parks & Wildlife updates

- Great Koala Park project still moving along slowly.
- National Parks are of the opinion that they are letting "almost too many people" into their parks, and that they are opening more parks where in fact the data shows more parks are closing than are opened. Association is holding firm on their representation of this fact to National Parks and doing whatever it can to champion our cause.
- National Parks handover to Aboriginal Elders has gone cold at the present
- National Parks Bookings system: Mixed messages about this looking at ways to improve system and they say the \$6 it is here to stay and then there is hope that it might be removed until a better solution is found. Trialling some number plate recognition, details have not been worked out yet. Number plate recognition is working in other states. There are discussions about night visits vs camping.

Animal encounters

Snake bites are on the rise in the greater Sydney area - be snake aware - even at home in your own back yard. Always carry a first aid kit and do a course – having first aid skills might save a life. Would members like a guest speaker to attend a meeting and discuss first aid?

Social media, magazines and club promotion

Some members of the public are always looking to complain and attempt to restrict our recreational activities. They will try to use our words and photos against us if it looks like we are doing the wrong thing, or are not where we should be or damaging the environment. We need to think about what we post in open pages on social media and in our newsletter and promotional material. It is good that we usually postpone trips when tracks are wet and that we do not drive 'off road' or bush bash and stay on only authorised open tracks and roads.

Batteries Explained

Several recent RV fires have been blamed on lithium ion batteries, but not all are created equal. Dr. Matthew Priestley, Lead Technology Translator at the UNSW, explains.

A lithium-ion battery pack is made up of one or more lithium-ion cells. Not every cell is fabricated from the same chemical components. If you compare two different cells from different manufacturers, then the chemical makeup and hence the performance may be quite different. One important component inside a lithium-ion cell is a thing called a cathode. We categorise the type of lithium ion battery by the chemical properties of the cathode. A LiFePo4 battery is a lithium ion battery where the cathode is constructed from lithium iron phosphate (LiFePo4). Each different cathode chemistry will provide different battery properties. An LFP (LiFePo4) typically has a good thermal stability, which gives better safety performance then some other battery chemistries such as Lithium Nickel Cobalt Aluminium Oxide (NCA). However, as a trade-off, the energy density of LPF is less than NCA. For the battery chemistries with worse thermal stability, the efficacy of the battery management system becomes more critical to ensure an adequate level of safety. LPF batteries do have a higher thermal stability than some other lithium-ion battery chemistries. This means that they have a higher threshold for heat before thermal runaway occurs than some other lithium-ion battery chemistries. Thermal runaway is a dangerous operating state where the cells are heated to a temperature where exothermic reactions occur, and the battery cooling system can no long handle the rapid heating of the cells. Here, the battery cell temperature will rapidly increase to very high levels, potentially causing a battery fire. Any lithium-ion battery can cause a fire if the thermal runaway threshold temperature is exceeded. Hence, it is vital to handle these products, even LFP batteries, with care. Damaging a lithium-ion battery (e.g., dropping it off a rooftop) can cause faults that may eventually lead to a thermal runaway event. Overcharging a lithium-ion battery is a common cause of thermal runaway. Many devices will have a battery management system (BMS) that cuts off the charging before overcharging can occur. However, a fault to either the charger or BMS may still result in a thermal runaway incident. Hence, it is recommended to avoid leaving lithium-ion batteries to charge overnight or leaving them on charge for long periods of time after they have reached full charge. A BMS is like a vigilant bodyguard for a lithium-ion battery. It may monitor various battery parameters to ascertain potentially unsafe operating conditions and, in such a situation, will aim to move the battery into a safe state. A well-made BMS will monitor parameters such as the cell voltages, currents and temperatures. A high-quality BMS is vital for the safety of lithium-ion batteries. Not all BMS products are created equal, and some may only monitor the voltage or temperature across groups of cells, which is not as accurate as monitoring each cell individually. Lithium-ion batteries have a preferred eNews

temperature range of roughly between 10-50 degrees Celsius. However, this temperature range will vary depending on the exact device. So, check the manual for their operating temperature range. I recommend trying to avoid operating any lithium-ion battery outside of the temperature range stated in the manual. Credit Grey Nomad Times

Cache me if you can

Veteran travellers love the ultimate hide-and-seek challenges of geocaching. It seems there are an awful lot of grey nomads who are travelling in a parallel universe to each other. While the majority may look out of the window as they travel and see a pretty – but fairly empty – landscape, others see one filled with all manner of treasures and potential treasure-seeking adventures. Keen geocachers are among those who see the potential adventures. And they think that non-geocaching grey nomads – or 'Muggles' as they call them – are missing out on some serious fun. They enjoy the search for a concealed cache. For the uninitiated, geocaching involves using a GPS or mobile device to hide and seek containers, called geocaches or caches, at specific locations marked by coordinates. Caches can be found literally anywhere, with the cache sizes and types having an impact on hiding options. Caches are rated in size, difficulty to find, and terrain. The Australian geocaching community is generally very aware of environment impacts and obtains relevant approvals in sensitive areas." While hiding and hunting caches is fun, so too is the parallel universe aspect of the hobby. "Everything in a cache, other than the logbook, is referred to as 'swag'. "These are usually trinkets of some sort for swapping and, generally, if you remove an item of swag, you're expected to replace it with something else." All physical caches contain a logbook and signing the logbook with your caching name is required for logging a 'find'.

Geocachers generally like to find, log and replace caches without detection by Muggles. Geocaching is a great hobby, whether you're a couple or on your own.



DRIVER AWARENESS NEWS

Our next Driver Awareness day will take place at Stockton Beach north of Sydney on November 3, and not surprisingly, our focus will be on sand driving. We will also cover vehicle recovery using the 'Hierarchy of Recovery'. You will need to bring your own recovery gear and a sense of adventure to learn and understand your vehicle. We will also drive along the beach and in the dunes (depending on which areas are open on the day). You will need to purchase a permit before we hit the sand, currently \$33 for 3 days or \$88 for an annual pass.

Our plan is **not** to conduct any kinetic (snatch) recoveries, but you still need to have your strap or rope (together with your other recovery gear) in your vehicle - just in case. There is a chance we may have to conduct a non-kinetic (tow) recovery if digging and traction boards aren't enough.

Note for new members - Don't worry about purchasing any recovery gear. We will have all the equipment necessary, and we will advise you on the day about what to purchase for future trips.

This trip is for members only. If you're interested, register on our new website.

Our Driver Awareness Team recently held a Zoom meeting to plan our activities for 2025. We have several surprises in store for trips throughout the year, with full details yet to be confirmed. I can reveal that the first trip for 2025 will most likely take place on Saturday, March 1 in the Kanangra-Boyd National Park, visiting Dingo Dell. Stay tuned for more information.

On a recent Driver Awareness trip, one of the skills we practised was wheel placement.



Learning where your wheels are in relation to the terrain you are driving over is a fundamental skill that every driver needs to master.

It leads on naturally to the skill of being able to pick the correct line for driving an obstacle. Like everything else, practice makes perfect.

We had 4 couples on the trip - Dave & Lyn, Mark & Karolyn, Troy & Sandi, Pam & David.


No need to write the cars they were driving as cars were only used from home to/from meeting point.


We met at Camp Cove, found an all day parking space and it was early due to the start of day light saving.

We walked to Watsons Bay to catch our first ferry of the day. Following are the pictures of what we saw on the day.



























Hornby Lighthouse on South Head.

XENFORO HELP

While we believe that XenForo is an intuitive platform there are differences in terminology when compared to the old website. Here is a user guide I have strung together to get you started now that we're live.

You can also find lots of info about Xenforo by searching the web e.g. "Xenforo User Guide"

Keep in mind that we are still working on the site so you will see changes and things moving around, logos added, banners & headers added etc.

Homepage

After logging on you would have found that the home page goes directly to the "Events" page.

Then at the top of that page you will see this banner:



"Home" will return you to the Events page

"Forums" will take you to the Forum List

"What's New" will display the latest activity

"Media" will take you to the Media Gallery where you can browse or load pics and create Albums

"Members" gives an overview of member activity


Then over on the right-hand side you will see:



Account management

Click your member name and everything you need to manage your account is available here. At the bottom of the displayed panel is the "log out" button.

Once you have access to your "Account details" it would be appreciated if you could complete the details such as vehicle details, address, phone number and emergency contact info; thanks



"Direct Messaging" (DM) is represented by the Envelope to the right of your member name and allows private messaging between members.

Select the envelope icon and you'll able to manage your messages. Click "Send Direct Message" to create a message.

"Search"

Once you select "Forums" as well as the Forum List you will see:




"Create / Post a Thread"


To post a new thread go to Forum List:


Watch / Unwatch



Thread subscriptions are "Watched". Watching a thread is a way to stay up to date on the topic and receive alerts or emails when there are new replies.

Member Avatar Functions

By clicking on another member's avatar leads you to several functions:



Reply

If you click "Reply" on a post within a thread then that post will be Quoted, even the last post. If you simply make use of the "Write your reply" box at the end of the thread then no posts are quoted. (This is the preferred method for contiguous responses).

Pics

Just Drag & Drop or also easy to post by selecting the little square box with the mountain image (11th across from the left) on the tool bar and then drag and drop an image. If you then click on the image you can resize it in place. You can also select to insert the thumbnail and/or full image.

The surrounding codes are "BB codes" and their descriptions are here in the Help link bottom RH corner of the screen: Help

You can also insert a link without having to worry about BB Codes by using the "Insert Link" (Ctrl+K) "chain links" icon

Note that there will be limits placed on Gallery image space, file size (1 meg) and type that can be stored these limits may need adjusting.

WHERE WAS I

Last months co-ordinates were 36°16′0″S 149°39′0″E has my location at Lake Creek Camping area in the Wadbilliga National Park, which is inland from Narooma on the NSW south coast. It encompasses the coastal escarpment and plateau areas surrounding the Tuross, Wadbilliga and Brogo Rivers and contained within the park boundary is the Brogo Wilderness Area. This is an ideal location to spend a couple of days and swimming holes are easy to find in the summer.

There are sign posted short walks to the Cascades and Tuross Falls from the Cascades Camping area. The walks are not difficult and are worthwhile, just allow plenty of time.

There are a few 4WD tracks within the park boundary and the main through route, the Wadbilliga Road, crosses from east to west and recommended for 4WD only. Beyond Wadbilliga Crossing the track climbs steeply, but should not present any problems to a 4WD. The Tuross River is normally 200mm to 300mm deep, but after rainy periods could be non passable, with no alternative route, forcing a turn around and retracing the track.



The Yuin people consider Wadbilliga National Park a sacred place and many sites in the park are strongly associated with Dreamtime stories. The dissected, rugged escarpment contains a network of bridle tracks that follow both high country and river courses, which Aboriginal people originally used. The bridle tracks are also the most tangible historical link with the first Europeans in the area and were used for transporting produce and moving stock from one location to another. The park is abundant in traditional foods and medicines.



Due to the rugged and isolated nature of the park, animal populations here have remained relatively undisturbed. Many of the park's animals are large marsupials such as swamp wallabies, eastern grey kangaroos and wombats. There are also possums, platypuses and echidnas and one of the biggest greater glider populations in all of Australia. The birdlife is varied too, with over 120 native species. Lyrebirds are common as are many colourful and tuneful bush birds.



The surrounding area has a variety of artefacts, structures and features that hark back to gold and silver mining eras, as well as the early forestry history of the local area. Today, visitors can still view various mining remains that are evidence of once arduous searches for gold and other precious materials.



Wadbilliga has many impressive examples of open forest, woodland, heath, swamp, bogs and numerous pockets of rainforest. There are some rare species of eucalypt and acacia that do not occur anywhere else. In the Wadbilliga Valley, yellow box and forest red gum can be seen, while on the ridge tops tower large stands of silvertop ash with snow gums at high altitudes. The Wadbilliga Plateau also has dwarf she-oaks and rare stunted mallee eucalypts.
