Association News & Updates: February 2025

Hello from Bill Twyman and David Wellham – your friendly Delegates to Four Wheel Drive NSW & ACT (Association). Association documents are located on our website. Please contact via email at -<u>delegates@subaruclub.com.au</u> for information about these topics or in relation to the Association. Looking forward to seeing you all on the tracks or at a meeting soon.

Association news

The available funds have reduced a small amount to \$146,557 - no increase in fees for over 13 years and an increase might be considered in the future – NB any increase needs to be proposed at least 15 months in advance i.e. – in April for July the following year.

The Association has transferred Incorporation from ACT to NSW – this will make it easier to comply as most members are located in NSW, the Constitution remains the same, details of Incorporation is on Association website.

NSW National Parks & Wildlife updates

You will see on Association Facebook site a shared link for a petition on National Parks we are supporting this and are working with others to make it happen, so please sign and add your name to the list. More details in this newsletter. LINK TO PETITION <u>HERE</u>

There is a major update due in March 2025 to the Parks Booking system – details soon.

Last year there was an area of State Forest that was due to be converted to National Parks and Parks dumped it. Parks are stretched for resources but spending a lot on infrastructure in other areas like Gardens of Stone – \$50M was spend on improving the road out to Glow Worm Tunnel, now you can drive any car out there – what a waste of limited funds.

Parks have purchased a number of parcels of land including a large area near Broken Hill – they are spending money on new locations but not managing and maintaining areas they already have due to R&M & infrastructure funding shortfalls – would be good to see some more remote places maintained, mainly down south of state.

Always worth being involved with National Parks – don't always get everything our way but without involvement we have NO communication. Submissions to Land Managers on Plans do assist with decisions – eg, options of usage at Gardens of Stone were modified due to large number of submissions from 4WD users. Consider completing submissions for areas that you visit and are interested in. Submissions will be open in 2025 for Great Koala Park, so please complete the submission so that Government is aware of our community's opinion.

One way to put Parks on notice and maybe get action is to ask questions on their Face Book page – why an area has been closed for years and years since the bushfire or weather event that closed it in the first place – why has work NOT been completed to restore access to areas after years of closure. We really want to access these areas for our recreation.

Great Koala Park in Coffs Harbour region – National Parks are committed to go ahead with Great Koala Park. The latest information is that the size of the proposed park has greatly reduced. This is a political driven park not one based on conservation Association is planning to meet with National Parks in February, in May there will be National Parks meeting in Coffs Harbour where scope/borders will be discussed. The August Quarterly meeting will be in Coffs Harbour where an afternoon meeting by invitation will be held, invite local representatives, stake-holders, businesses and politicians. National Parks have said the Association will be included in discussions and planning. Some people in National Parks are keen to retain access for 4WDing. The current opinion from Association is that this park will not solve problems with Koalas as they are doing very well in this area. Association states this park would be bad for environment and local economies. Timber would need to be imported which is worst for the environment and costlier. Local villages and towns would lose industry and as access is reduced, tourism would also affect local economies. We will keep you informed about this park and give both sides so that you have information to make an informed opinion regarding the need for this new park.

ACMC/AAAA/ Transport

Government are proposing to rewrite all ADRs (Australian Design Rules for vehicles - more information to follow when available.

Animal encounters

Snake bites are on the rise in the greater Sydney area - be snake aware - even at home in your own back yard. Always carry a first aid kit and do a course – having first aid skills might save a life. Would members like a guest speaker to attend a meeting and discuss first aid?

These courses are mixed delivery including Pre-learning (e-learning including online assessment (where applicable) and face-to-face training and assessment day.

Pre-course learning and assessment must be attempted before your face-to-face course day. It is estimated to take 4-7 hours, depending on your knowledge and experience.

Currently there are no Advanced Training courses.

Exact Meeting Time & Place: Confirmed on Enrolment

Duration: The training typically runs from 8.15am through to approximately 4.00pm

Lunch & Morning Tea: Members should bring their own lunch, drinks and snacks.

What to Bring: Bring your Driver's License, Chair, your 4wd vehicle, pen, clipboard, UHF radio, recovery kit and anything else you would normally take on a 4WD trip. Also bring any special tools/keys required to remove the spare tyre and tow bar goose neck. Participants will be required to use their own snatch strap for the practical exercise.

License - This is needed for certification to be issued.

What to Wear: Suitable hard-top footwear & weather appropriate clothing.

Registration: You are required to register via the link for the course. Once registered & paid, you will be mailed the 4WD Guidebook and emailed a link to the e-learning platform 3- 4 weeks out from your training day.

Payment: Cost is \$90.00 – Payment will be made directly to Getabout Training Services.

Preparation: Participants are expected to have read their copy of the course materials, and completed all the questions and documentation. You will be required to supply a USI number, if you don't have a USI number can you please go to the link and complete the enrolment, so you can obtain one, this will save a lot of time on the day. <u>www.usi.gov.au</u>

Social media, magazines and club promotion

Some members of the public are always looking to complain and attempt to restrict our recreational activities. They will try to use our words and photos against us if it looks like we are doing the wrong thing, are not where we should be or damaging the environment. We need to think about what we post in open pages on social media and in our newsletter and promotional material. It is good that we usually postpone trips when tracks are wet and that we do not drive 'off road' or bush bash and stay on only authorised open tracks and roads.

Local emergency info at your fingertips

This summer, be ready to deal with the unexpected by downloading the **Hazards Near Me NSW app** – your official source of emergency information on bushfires, floods and other severe weather events. Use the app to **set a local Watch Zone** so you receive notifications about emergency situations happening near your premises, staff and clients. Watch out for track closures – one site is NPWS site. Remember to make sure any fires that you have are completely extinguished.

To the President and Members of the Legislative Council, the petitioners of New South Wales state that the NSW Government must identify its position and strategy on the management of NSW National Parks, specifically regarding the provision of ongoing and unrestricted public access to national parks for public recreational use, including but not limited to recreational four-wheel driving, motorcycle riding, mountain biking, camping, hiking, fishing and hunting. The petitioners request that the House conduct a parliamentary inquiry into all track and area closures in all NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service managed land over the last 10 years, including detailed justification for the restriction of public access in each area, and the ensuing economic impacts on local communities and associated industries.

DRIVER AWARENESS NEWS

On February 8, our Driver Awareness Team (David, Bill, Alex and Michael) attended a workshop at Asquith. The first session was on tyres, presented by a technician from Toyo Tires. We learnt about tyre construction, tread patterns, correct pressures, and so on. One of the most interesting things for me was the way that many manufacturers are now adding a style of tyre that fits in between all-terrains and mud-terrains, often called a rugged-terrain.



We also had a very informative session presented by David Foster from Getabout Training Services. He talked about the importance of customising our awareness sessions to the needs of our Club members. As an example, he talked about a recent weekend he conducted for Grenadier owners. He also showed us how trailer brake controllers work, and how poor weight distribution in trailers can cause serious issues with handling.

Phone Service: Telstra yes, other providers have patchy service


Closest Town: Bawley Point has a small shopping complex for takeaway food, bottle shop, pizza shop, IGA & newsagent/post office

General Overview: Firewood and ice can be bought at the Pretty Beach National Parks office. A great campground that has easy access and not too crowded. Sites vary in size, so worth checking the map when you book. Wildlife is prolific, particularly kangaroos and possums. A short, sharp staircase leads down to a reasonably small, but beautiful beach. Rock platforms are exposed at low tide. The beach is unpatrolled. Pretty Beach is also the starting point for the Murramarang South Coast Walk.

Nearby: Spanning 44km of dramatic coastline, and home to the spectacular 3 day Murramarang South Coast Walk, Murramarang National Park is the ultimate spot to explore the cliffs, headlands and pristine beaches of the NSW south coast. There is a large variety of campsites and accommodation options throughout the park.

The whole park offers excellent swimming, boating, walking and fishing opportunities and the whole area offers spectacular scenery at every turn.

Pretty Beach is approximately halfway between the south coast hubs of Ulladulla Batemans Bay. Both offering all the services and shops that you could need.

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Classic Registration

The process to change your car to classic plates takes some time but there are cost savings. Vehicle to be at least 30 years old, 3.5t GVM or under, garaged in NSW and able to be registered in NSW. Vehicles on classic plates can be driven up to 60 days each year plus on club trips.

Completing all requirements for Classic Registration is responsibility of member. Compliance with Classic Registration is responsibility of member. When members attend a club trip they need to be registered on trip on club website and be able to prove such instead of using log book for that trip. Your car registration is linked to your membership – if you do not maintain membership your car registration and CTP insurance lapses.

Our Club - Subaru & Recreational 4WD Club INC is affiliated with Four Wheel Drive NSW & ACT INC, (4WD NSW & ACT), our association.

Our association is affiliated with Australian Confederation of Motor Clubs (ACMC).

The ACMA is an approved organisation with RMS in the Classic Vehicle Scheme (CVS).

Therefore, a member of our club with a suitable vehicle is able to register it under CVS.

In summary the process is -

- Pay club \$20 Administration fee, use link on club website or EFT to club account ANZ Bank: BSB 012 514 Account 315253707
- Email <u>delegates@subaru4wdclub.com.au</u> a request that RMS form 1835 with club stamp is sent to you, Email to include a copy of current registration papers and your postal address
- When RMS form 1835 is received back from Delegates, obtain a blue slip or pink slip from authorised inspection station (paper hard copy)
- NB blue slip inspection is more thorough then pink slip inspection, be prepared for defects
- NB blue slip is required the first year and pink slip every year after
- Complete stamped RMS form 1835
- Pay ACMC fee see attached sheet from ACMC to confirm requirements
- Send completed & stamped RMS form 1835, **copy** of blue slip or pink slip, copy of Engineer's certificate (if applicable) to ACMC to stamp, complete and return
- Complete RMS form 1246 first year only
- When the forms are returned, go to Service NSW with stamped forms, fees, existing number plates(if first year) and other required items
- You need to go to Service NSW within 42 days of the date of blue slip or pink slip
- Service NSW should give you Classic plates and a log book at the first registration and a new log when required every other registration
- Notify your existing CTP and car insurance company

Historic Registration is another scheme with RMS, but our club is not a part of that scheme.

CVS Registration Process

ELIGIBILITY

- your vehicle must be 30 years of age or older, counted from the year of manufacture,
- your vehicle must be 3.5 tonnes Gross Vehicle Mass or under,
- your vehicle must comply with the applicable NSW vehicle standards,
- you must be a current, financial member of a club affiliated with the ACMC,
- your vehicle can be a replica or an Individually Constructed Vehicle (ICV) that is 30 years of age or older (based on the build completion date),
- The vehicle to be registered must be garaged in NSW,
- You must be a resident of NSW.

Classic vehicles are 30 years of age or older that have certain modifications not permitted under the Historic vehicle scheme (HVS). Vehicles which are eligible to be registered under the HVS can also be registered under the CVS. These modifications may be owner certified or significantly modified. If significantly modified, they must have a valid compliance certificate issued by a licensed certifier.

- Australian Low Volume & Individually Constructed Vehicle Association (ALVICVA)
- Australian Street Rod Federation Inc. (ASRF)

- Australian National Street Machine Association Inc. (ANSMA)
- Drag-Ens Hot Rod Club (DRAGENS)
- Motorcycle Council of NSW (MCCofNSW)

APPLICATION - Allow two weeks turnaround of your paperwork.

- 1. Complete Application for Conditional Registration (TfNSW form 1246).
- Complete Classic Vehicle Declaration (TfNSW form 1835). Make sure you use the full, correct Club Name on the Classic Vehicle Declaration form in section 1 titled "Club membership details (Primary Club name first)" DO NOT COMPLETE SECTION 3.
- 3. Obtain a **Blue slip** for the vehicle. Blue slips only last 42 days. The blue slip provider must fill in and sign page three of your "Application for Conditional Registration form" in the section titled "Vehicle Identified by".
- 4. Obtain your "Primary club" stamp in the box (bottom right of the Classic Vehicle Declaration)
- 5. If the vehicle is subject to engineered modifications get a copy of the VSCCS Certificate.

What you need to send the ACMC:

- The ORIGINAL Classic Vehicle Declaration Form (1835) completed and stamped by your club,
- A clear copy of your blue slip, (please remove the brake test before you make the copy),
- A clear copy of your engineer's certificate (if applicable),
- Your contact phone number,
- Your contact email address,
- A printout or email of your payment receipt or a cheque, a money order, or cash,
- An express post envelope if you need it returned quickly (optional).

NOTE: TfNSW will not accept emailed documents, so they need to be posted to the ACMC for endorsement. Processing is done at Seven Hills. The ACMC is the Approved Organisation. Maggie and Rachael are the responsible persons to complete Section 3 for you. They will be available on the phone for enquiries or in person to process your paperwork.

DO NOT use your vehicle to identify your payment, it is not unique and could be applied to the incorrect documents. This causes confusion and delays.

We accept: Cash or Direct Credit.

Service NSW

The following must be presented to a Service NSW Service Centre to establish the Conditional Registration:

- Classic Vehicle Declaration approved and signed by the Responsible Person not older than 42 days,
- Current blue slip not older than 42 days,
- Compliance certificate (if required). (VSCCS or Old ECS),
- Vehicle import approval (if the vehicle is imported),
- Application for conditional registration completed by the applicant,
- Proof of registration entitlement (e.g., receipt of purchase),
- Proof of identity (e.g., NSW driver licence),
- The appropriate fee.

Once issued, your new plates must have "Conditional Registration" on them. Please email the new plate number to cvs@acmc.asn.au with your full name, club name and vehicle details.

RENEWAL - Allow two weeks turnaround of your paperwork.

- Complete Classic Vehicle Declaration (TfNSW form 1835). Make sure you use the full, correct Club Name on the Classic Vehicle Declaration form in section 1 titled "Club membership details (Primary Club name first)" DO NOT COMPLETE SECTION 3.
- 2. Obtain a Pink slip for the vehicle.
- 3. Obtain your "Primary club" stamp in the box (bottom right of the Classic Vehicle Declaration).
- 4. If the vehicle is subject to engineered modifications get a copy of the VSCCS Certificate.

What you need to send the ACMC:

- The ORIGINAL Classic Vehicle Declaration Form (1835) completed and stamped by your club,
- A clear copy of your pink slip, (please remove the brake test before you make the copy),
- A clear copy of your registration papers
- A clear copy of your engineer's certificate (if applicable),

Service NSW

The following must be presented to a Service NSW Service Centre to renew Conditional Registration:

NOTE: TfNSW will not accept online payments for CVS, it must be done at the Service Centre.

The Unknowns

A REMINDER DON'T FEED THE ANIMALS

There are few things that match the thrill of encountering a wild animal in its natural habitat. It's a rare and unique glimpse into wildlife playing out right in front of you! When you encounter an inquisitive native buddy, your Prst thought might be to offer them a bit of your organic muesli bar. It seems like a great idea at the time, right?

Unfortunately all of those "Don't feed the animals" signs are there for a reason, and while it might feel good at the time, feeding wildlife can have real and harmful knock-on effects.

But why, what's the big deal ??

Human food is not for native animals

Let's be honest, that chocolate-coated muesli bar in your pack may be OK for you, but it's not good for a wild animal that's not used to processed human food. Losing the balance of their natural diet can make wildlife very sick, as can many of the ingredients in your lunchbox. Animals can quickly become addicted to the convenience of human food and focus on seeking it out instead of eating a balanced diet.

They lose their ability to forage and exercise less

Many native animals are adapted to spending hours foraging for healthy food in native bushland. Throw human food into the mix and they can become lazy, hanging around people all day, forgetting to exercise when they would normally be foraging around.

Animals can become so used to receiving food that they become reliant on handouts instead of foraging for their natural food. This can result in some animals starving despite being surrounded by edible bushland during low season when humans aren't around.

They'll ruin your stuff to get it

Food's my biggest motivator and I'm a well-adjusted, civilised human. Now imagine what a possum will do for a tasty piece of white bread! Feeding the animals gives them a taste of the contents of your camp pantry, making it incredibly difbcult to keep your food safe from them.

Determined animals with a taste for human food (and no fear of humans because they've been hand-fed) will often damage tents and cooking equipment to find a morsel.

Hand-fed animals can become aggressive

You're never the only person to offer food to the kangaroo hopping around camp. Wild animals can come to rely on humans for food and can become aggressive when they're not fed; very dangerous and unpleasant. Make sure you're not ruining it for future visitors just so that you can get a little closer to the wildlife.

Looks can be deceiving. Kangaroos can look extremely nice and cuddly, but if you get too close or try to feed them they can become dangerously aggressive very quickly and viciously attack, particularly the large males during mating season or females protecting their joeys.

It disrupts the natural order

Wild animals have a single-minded focus on the next chow-down, so if a popular walk or campsite becomes a reliable food source, animals tend not to leave. This can lead to increased population densities of some species forcing other vulnerable species out and increasing the spread of disease. It can also impact natural breeding cycles and cause birds to stop their natural migration patterns.

Their aim isn't perfect: you could lose a finger!

Hand-feeding goannas might seem like a good way to get close to these magnibcent lizards but do you really want your bngers getting that close to the sharp teeth of this poorly sighted, powerful animal? With those razor-sharp claws, you also really don't want these climbing experts to get a fright and mistake you for a tree! Possums may look all cute and innocent too, especially the ones with joeys on their backs, but many people have been bitten by a possum who has mistaken a finger for a piece of fruit.


If you want to see wildlife, it's best to visit them in their habitat, rather than encouraging them into ours. So avoid throwing uneaten food into the bushes and giving the animals rotting leftovers from the barbie.

It might sound like a guilt trip but the fact is, feeding native animals is the worst thing you can do for them, despite how cute they are or how much they appear to be enjoying it. National parks are about experiencing the pristine environment in its natural state. So get out there and spot some native animals. And keep your snacks to yourself.
